Middleridge Holiday Lighting Contest

Each year, the Middleridge Civic Association (MCA) sponsors a Holiday Lighting Contest. The Rules for the contest are posted in this issue of the newsletter. Basically, the judging will take place in the evening on Saturday, December 17, with a "rain date" of Sunday, December 18. There are four award categories (Traditional, Williamsburg, Scott Wascavage [formerly the Wattage award – named in memory of a neighbor who loved to extensively decorate his home and yard but

passed away at a young age], and the Judges' Special Award) for individual homes, as well as a Group Award. It is recommended that an MCA member (or group) review the rules, determine which award suites them best, and decorate accordingly. Judges are generally previous year winners, who are thus ineligible for an award this year. Last year's winners are encouraged to contact Al Obuchowski, 703-352-1380, to volunteer as judges for this year. Award winners have a sign placed in their yard, signifying the award. They are also given a special

gift from the MCA.

In addition, there is another contest which is conducted online at the MCA website. It is the Community Award and all MCA members are eligible to select the home they think is the best in the neighborhood.

Middleridge has been known for its beautiful decorations and the judges are faced with many potential winners, but this is a great event that many anticipate excitedly. If you have any questions concerning the contest or its judging, please contact Al Obuchowski .

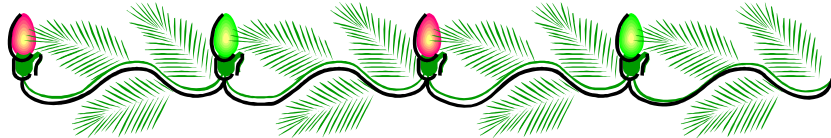

Middleridge Holiday Lighting Decorations Contest

Who: Middleridge and Keys Crossing residents Middleridge Civic Association members only; must have joined before October 31). Winners of an award from the previous two years are ineligible for this year's awards but are encouraged to participate as judges for the contest.

When: Saturday, December 17, 2011, 6:00 PM to 10:00 PM. Please have your light displays ready and working during these hours if you wish to participate in the judging contest. (Rain date will be Sunday, December 18, 2011).

Judging Categories/Criteria



Williamsburg Award - Decorations are in the classic Williamsburg style. All lights must be white - no colored lights. May use candles, evergreen (real or artificial), ribbons and fruit displays over doorways, windows, etc. Spotlights may be used to enhance the appearance of the evergreen or fruit displays. Figures are not included in this display category.

Traditional Award - Lights can be any color, any style and may frame the house, and/or draped over bushes, trees or other parts of the yard and home. Figures, like Santa, snowman, deer or other seasonal creatures may be used but not to excess. Spotlights may be used to enhance the display.

Scott Wascavage Award (formerly the Wattage Award) - Consists of large, extensive display of colored and/or white lights and figures (animated or not). This can include lights on the house, roof, trees, bushes, fences, walkways, basketball hoops or other yard features. It is all about volume, with a touch of amazement.

Judges Special Award - Awarded to a home that uses a unique technique to achieve a special decorative, festive holiday display. This may include styles or themes that do not quite fit any of the above categories or may be a mixture of several categories.

Group Award - Awarded to a group of three or more houses that are similarly decorated and that present a consistent look for the Holiday spirit. Any tasteful decorating style can be used. Each house will receive recognition.

Community Award - This is an award that any Middleridge Civic Association (MCA) member home can vote for as deserving of special recognition. The award is made to the MCA member house that receives the majority of the votes cast. Enter your selection on the MCA website. Voting will close at noon on the day of Holiday Judging. This award will also be announced that evening.

[**Note:** Only active MCA member votes will be counted, with no more than two votes per home. The winner must be an MCA member. The Board will assure these requirements are met.]

Prizes - Each category will have one grand prize winner that will receive a lovely holiday gift, compliments of the Middleridge Civic Association. Group Award winners remain eligible for individual awards. Winners will be notified the night of judging and a sign will be placed in the front yard of the winning homes. This information will also be posted at the main entrances to Middleridge as well as on the website and the newsletter.

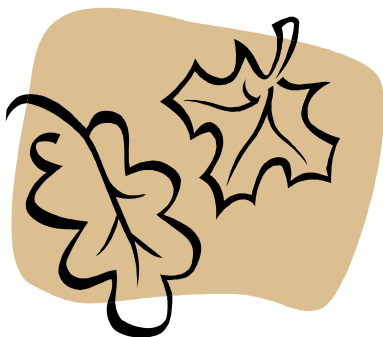

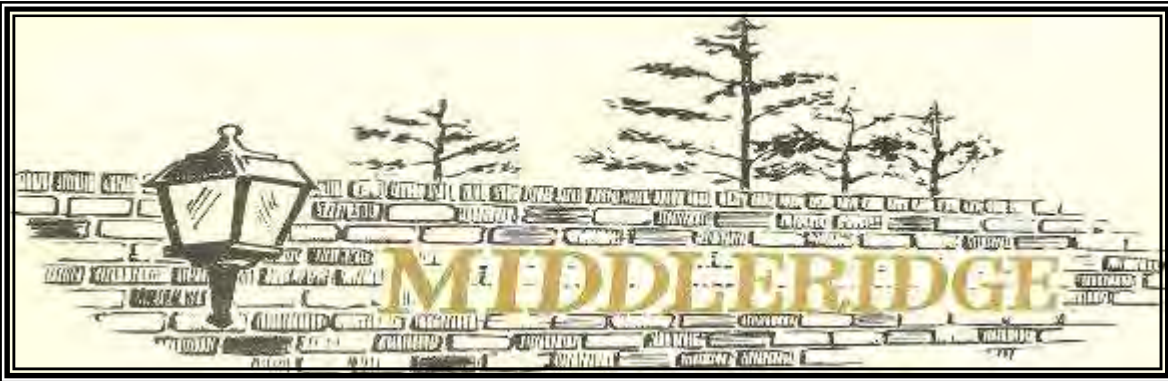

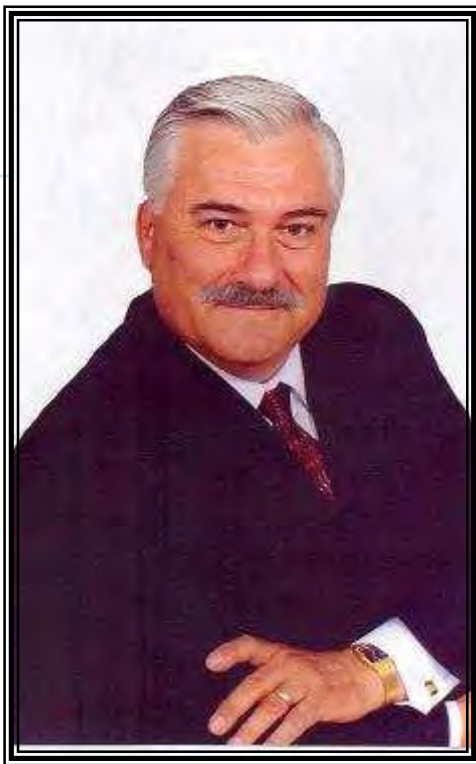
Leaf Mulch



Fairfax County has free leaf mulch available starting in November. Rather than individuals having to go to the transfer station or the landfill, I'm trying to arrange for a truck load of leaf mulch to be delivered to the neighborhood. You can use it instead of shredded bark or to enrich your gardens. I'm trying to gauge whether or not there is enough interest to do this. The minimum load is 40 cubic yards. It would have to be used up so that it wouldn't block any storm drains. Unless you have a pickup truck, you would have to go to the park or a cul de sac with some type of container (s) and lug the mulch back to your yard. I figure this would still be faster than making multiple trips to the transfer station. Let me know if you would be interested in some of the mulch. Thanks.

Annual Middleridge Luminary Display

**December 24th
From Dusk till Dawn!
(If you can make them last that long!)**

**Sand available on Joshua Davis Court by
December 9th**

The Most Simple & Basic Luminary Display Recipe

- 1) Plan how many luminaries you will need in advance. Usually about 1 bag for every 5 or 6 feet of space. (Don't forget your driveway if you are going to include that as well.)
- 2) Purchase a pack of brown paper lunch bags from the grocery store or dollar store.
- 3) Purchase 1 candle for each luminary you wish to make. Votives and Tealights are best since they contain their flames well and usually won't end up burning up the entire bag. (Tealights last about 3 to 4 hours ... Votives last about 6 to 8.)
- 4) Take a trip to Joshua Davis Court and pick up enough sand to fill each bag 1/3 way full. (The sand is free so take as much as you need.)
- 5) When you're ready, fill each bag 1/3 full of sand and place the Votive or Tealight in the middle. Carefully light the candle and "Volla" you have your basic luminary.

Neighborhood Watch

December brings with it cold weather and hot chocolate, gifts and cheer, and for some of us, some vacation visiting family and friends. With these things come snow and potential accidents, gift boxes for electronics, and empty houses. But how do these things relate to neighborhood watch? Simple:

First, it's important for all of us to watch our speed in the neighborhood. Whether you drive a silver BMW Z3 or silver Honda Odyssey, speeding in our neighborhood continues to be an issue. Halloween night brought about more speeding and complaints of speeding than we've heard in a long time. For that reason, we're asking all of you to slow down. Ice makes the roads so much more dangerous so we really need to all make the extra effort to reduce the speed, stay attentive to other cars, and come to complete stops at posted signs.

Second, the holiday spirit of giving and receiving is excellent but it's important to break down your boxes from those new televisions, appliances, and toys. Putting them out as is advertises all of the new items in your home and makes it easier for a would be thief to target you.

Lastly, if you are leaving the area for the holidays, we recommend stopping your mail, keeping some lights on, and letting a neighbor know that you will be away. Let people you trust know and ask that they keep an eye on the house. If you'd like, let Neighborhood Watch know and we'll try to do the same. Obviously no one can guarantee that nothing will happen to your house, but a watched house is better than an unwatched house and may assist reporting suspicious activity around you residence.

Something further for all of Middleridge, in the past few months, we've had an influx of car break-ins and an unfortunate case of vandalism.

As a community, if you hear something in the middle of night, or see unmarked vans or people acting suspiciously, don't hesitate to CALL the non-emergency police phone number (703-691-2131). I've called it before and the police take every call seriously and appreciate a neighborhood that watches out for others. We owe it to each other to do this simple service if we expect the same in return. Also, please remember to always lock your car doors, even when they are parked in front of your house. Some of these recent break-ins have involved unlocked vehicles. Lastly, please ensure that nw@middleridgecivicassociation.org is marked as a safe address in your email address book. We've had several instances of some of the neighborhood watch emails going to people's spam boxes. Thank you.

Stay safe, stay alert, and have a happy and responsible holiday season.

Response to the competition was overwhelming, with nearly 100,000 public votes cast for 25 diverse nominated objects that showcase Virginia's diverse history, heritage, and culture and the role that the artifacts play in telling those stories. The "People's Choice Award" winners reflect three nominations that garnered the most significant amount of public votes, while the final "Top 10" winners were selected from an independent panel of collections and conservation experts.

Slated as an annual competition, *Virginia's Top 10 Endangered Artifacts* project is needed more than ever in order to create increased awareness and support for maintaining our nation's artifacts as funding for preservation continues to decrease. *Read more about the winning objects and view photographs of all nominations at www.vatop10artifacts.org.*

"We are thrilled with the incredible online voting turnout the program garnered, which serves to highlight that the preservation of our collective history is an issue that really matters to the people of Virginia," said Margo Carlock, executive director of the Virginia Association of Museums. "The Top Ten winners highlight not only the unique stories found in collections across Virginia, but also the challenges that accompany preserving these artifacts."

Project manager Christina Newton describes the review process as, "fascinating to witness." "Each reviewer brought their specific area of expertise to bear as they considered threats to the various artifacts as well as their significance to their local communities, the state, and even the nation. Selecting only ten items was very difficult because they each hold such incredible stories!"

ABOUT THE PROGRAM



Virginia's Top 10 Endangered Artifacts is a project of the Virginia Collections Initiative and the Virginia Association of Museums and is made possible by a grant from the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services. The IMLS is the primary source of federal support for the nation's 123,000

libraries and 17,500 museums. The Institute's mission is to create strong libraries and museums that connect people to information and ideas.
